- 1. (a) Discuss "three strands of expansion of modernist literature temporal, spatial, and vertical." (10)
  - (b) Comment on Indian graphic narratives with relevant examples. (10)

- 2. (a) Describe the ironies of the patriarchal stance in Yeats' "A Prayer for My Daughter". (10)
  - (b) "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrockrepresented a break with the immediate past as radical as that of the English romantic poets, Coleridge and Wordsworth, in *Lyrical Ballads*." Discuss. (10)
- 3. "Something there is that doesn't love a wall" and "Good fences make good neighbors." Through this balance the poet provides a model of artistic integrity that even the most partisan ideologues cannot corrupt. Explain with reference to the "Mending Wall".

- 4. "The primary function of poetry, as of all the arts, is to make us more aware of ourselves and the world around us. I do not know if such increased awareness makes us more moral or more efficient. I hope not. I think it makes us more human, and I am quite certain it makes us more difficult to deceive." Discuss with reference to Auden's "September 1, 1939".
- 5. (a) The struggles of Estragon and Vladimir relate to one's personal struggles In today's world. Explain with suitable references from *Waiting for Godot*. (10)

(b) *Death of a Salesman* is inspired by the Great Depression and failure of obtaining the 'American Dream'. Elaborate by giving suitable references from the text. (10)

- 6. "If Princely India seemed to Forster like Alice's Wonderland, the situation of British India at the time of Gandhi's non-co-operation movement proved to be one of complete disenchantments." Elucidate with reference to *A Passage to India*. (20)
- 7. (a) Comment on the religious and intellectual awakening in *A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man*. (10)
  - (b) Nathaniel Hawthorne has used the supernatural device in *The Scarlet Letter*. Discuss with references from the text. (10)
- 8. R. K. Narayan's *The Guide* has been adapted into films and plays. Explain the differences between the original book and adaptations. (20)

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
